

Follow the Star – Calm and Bright



How do you prepare for Christmas? Are you one of those superorganised people who have the shopping for Christmas presents completed by October? Do you despair at the commercialisation of Christmas and hope it will soon be over? Or do you seek to find some calm amidst the storm and focus more on Jesus and his coming?

We are going to be exploring our response to the Christmas story throughout Advent and Christmas: The good news we share, the Shepherd we trust, the Saviour we respond to, the Lord we follow, Immanuel ("God-with-us") we walk with, the prince of peace we rest in, the king we serve.

Between Epiphany and Candlemas our Sunday services are looking at our purpose: set aside for a purpose, enabling our purpose, united in purpose and revealing God's purpose.

To help us focus more purposefully on Jesus there are some aids available that we can use.

There is a bookmark in church with a prayer and the QR code for the Church of England resources available by typing <u>cofe.io/CalmAndBright</u> into your browser bar (the capital letters are important!). There are also copies of the Meditations to use between Christmas and Epiphany available in church for £1.

There is an Advent Calendar for families – each door opens on a picture, a word for the day, and a QR code for further family activities – see the Rector if you would like one.

Use any or all of the above to help you to find moments of calm amidst all the busy-ness of the season and focus on keeping Christ at the centre of your Christmas.







Teaching the Lord's Prayer...

(taken from Parish Pump)

The Archbishop of York Stephen Cottrell plans to teach the Lord's Prayer across the North of England throughout 2025, a priority of his vision for Faith in the North.

Archbishop Stephen is to visit dioceses in the Northern Province of the C of E where he will be sharing the relevance of the Lord's Prayer to our world today, encouraging people to pray and live by this, as part of their missionary discipleship.

Archbishop Stephen is encouraging prayer, storytelling and church planting inspired by the Northern Saints such as Hild, Cuthbert, Bede and Paulinus. The aim is to foster deeper connections with the Christian faith across the north and renew the Church's missionary purpose to share God's love with all.

Archbishop Stephen said "In less than 70 words, Jesus gives us a prayer to learn by heart and a prayer that gets inside our hearts, shaping the way we live. The Lord's Prayer surely is the best place to start. It is said in just about every church service, from the coronation of the King to the christening of a child. It's a challenging prayer and when we say this prayer together, we become part of God's movement of change, of bringing God's heaven to earth. It teaches us how to pray. But it also teaches us how to live".

There is such a gap and nothing else can fill it, but I came across these lovely words the other day and they were so appropriate."

There is a God who hears every lament

There is a God who transforms even the deepest grief

Therefore you have hope

You shall sing again, but with a different tune

You shall dance again, but with a different step

You shall laugh again, but with a different breath

Not yet, but one day

For there is a God who heals your wound with the gentlest hand.


She described the funeral which ended with that lovely hymn of hope,

"In Christ alone my hope is found

He is my light, my strength, my song."

and commented, "and that's how I try to live out my life". She is gradually getting back into her routine again and is out on the streets of Mansfield on Friday nights as part of the Prayer Patrol! It warmed my heart to hear of her courage and her strong faith.

This year has been a sad one for many in our own parish who have been bereaved and so I hope the words of that wonderful hymn will ring true in their hearts, and in each of our hearts, and that Christ will truly be our light, our strength and our song.



A letter from Bishop Mark



A letter to the Diocese of Chester Tuesday, 12 th November, 2024

Decs Friends,

I am writing to you in the wake of the publication of the Makin review into the abuse perpetrated by John Smyth and today's resignation announcement from the Archbishop of Canterbury. I know that there are many questions, quite a lot of which remain unanswered. Like you, I am listening to the media coverage with all manner of mixed feelings, mainly grief over the failings of our church. You will know what a focus this kind of work has been in this diocese following the Pearl Review four years ago: there is no place for cover-up or complicity with abuse in any part of society, least of all in the church.

I do want to say a number of things as we seek to respond in the Diocese of Chester.

First and foremost; if the report raises concerns for you in any way at all, please do reach out for support. You can either talk with our safeguarding team or Safe Spaces and contact details are available overleaf. These conversations can trigger all manner of emotions in us, and support is available.

Secondly, please keep victims and survivors in your prayers. This is a very hard time for those who have journeyed through the kind of horrific experiences Makin outlines. Our aim to be 'survivor centred and trauma informed' can never just be a strapline. Please be kind to each other, and please pray.

Thirdly, may I thank all who are working to make our parishes, chaplaincies, and church schools safer spaces. I appreciate all that you do to enable this; there is always more work needed, but we

can be grateful.

Fourthly, alongside my deep regret and concern about the failings of the church, I want to express gratitude for the good things that Archbishop Justin has done in this role.

As we have found in Chester Diocese, safeguarding is always a shared responsibility, and I am thankful for all who partner in this vital part of the life of the church.

Friends, please pray. Please care for each other. Please reach out for support if you need it. I will write further in due time.

125 years ago, on 5th Dec 1899 that Henry Tate, British sugar merchant and philanthropist, died. He established the Tate Gallery in London.

75 years ago, on 13th Dec 1949 that Jerusalem became the capital of Israel, replacing Tel Aviv.

70 years since, in 1954, the then BibleLands Mission Aid Society (now *Embrace the Middle East*), first printed the "Bethlehem Carol Sheet".

Remember Christians facing persecution this Christmas

This Christmas, there are about 360 million Christians worldwide who will not be celebrating the birth of Jesus Christ.

They dare not do so.

That's because 1 in every 7 believers globally live in countries where they suffer oppression and discrimination for their faith.

So, instead of going to church and singing carols, they face violence and abduction, while others risk losing their jobs and livelihood. According to the latest World Watch List from Open Doors, there are 13 countries where Christians face extreme persecution, and 37 more where they face general persecution.

Fortunately, there are charities working on the frontlines to help these persecuted believers. You may wish to support one this Christmas, as a way of showing solidarity with our Christian brothers and sisters worldwide.

Christian Solidarity Worldwide - specialises in freedom of religion or belief (FoRB). They work in 25 countries across Africa, Asia, Latin America and the Middle East. CSW is the only advocacy organisation with a sole focus on freedom of religion or belief that has United Nations accreditation.
